

## Identifying Sowerby Pressed Glass

Pressed decorative glassware was made in factories using moulds instead of traditional blown glass. Glass bottles were often made using both mould and blown process. If you look carefully you can always detect the pressed glass by one or more seams.

## Other pieces

Amber pressed glass posy vase – no identifying marks but probably made by local firm Davidson's in the 1930s



Clear pressed glass celery vase – star on bottom may be a trademark, now untraceable



Clear pressed glass celery vase – Barnook trademark  
Probably made in 1930s



Aqua blue glass sauce bottle – moulded body and blown neck, made by Gartons, the original manufacturers of HP Sauce from early 1900s



Clear heat resistant moulded glass tumbler – trademark Vetravir, from Italy, probably in 1990s
